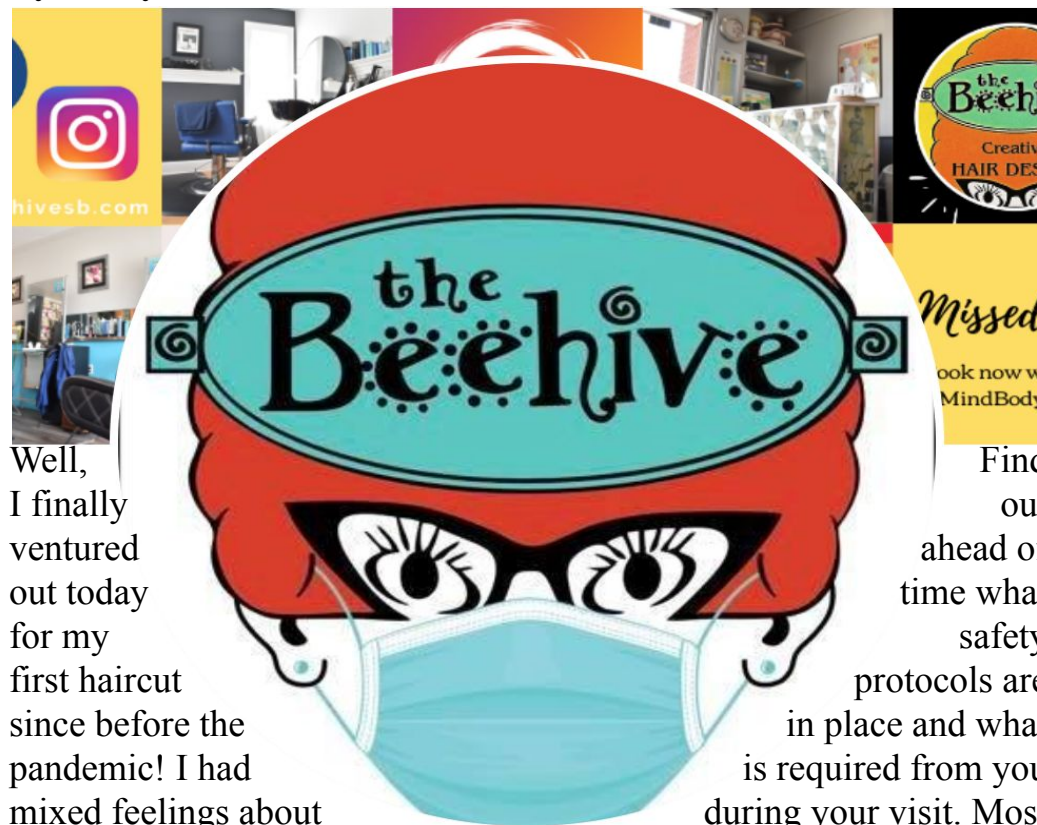

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Find out ahead of time what safety protocols are in place and what is required from you during your visit. Most salons will require masks and some will request payment by credit card.

Let your stylist know ahead of time what services you need to keep your visit as short as possible.

Your health is of the utmost importance. When you arrive, if you are not comfortable with what you see, you have the right to leave.

East Bank Architecture

Our feature this week, the 4th in the series, is the Z Crepeau building. Built in 1892 on Hill Street, it sits just north of St. Joseph Catholic Church. While the building might appear simple at first glance, it contains some of the classic elements of the Italianate style. Italianate commercial buildings are known as one of the United States' most prominent architectural features. The Italianate style is essential to the symbolic American landscape, prominent in most Midwestern town centers. The Crepeau building most recently housed the Sugar and Spice Candy Store. While Sugar and Spice is long gone, its legacy lives on at the South Bend
